

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


COURSE OVERVIEW

Target Audience and Course Overview This conference is designed for psychiatrists, neurologists, psychologists, nurses, social workers, internists, and family practice physicians. It will focus on neurodegenerative diseases, progressive illnesses primarily affecting older individuals who typically present with both neurological and psychiatric symptoms. The most common neurodegenerative diseases are Alzheimer's disease (AD) and Parkinson's disease (PD). Common psychiatric complications of these diseases include depression, anxiety, psychosis, and cognitive changes. For example, over 50% of patients with Parkinson's disease may eventually develop dementia. In spite of the high prevalence of psychiatric complications in AD and PD, research shows that these complications are underdiagnosed and undertreated, in part due to gaps in our knowledge base. This symposium will present the most current information and research on the diagnosis and treatment of common psychiatric disturbances associated with neurodegenerative diseases.

Guest faculty will join full-time faculty from the Philadelphia VA Medical Center and the University of Pennsylvania School of Medicine.

Date and Location The *2nd Annual PADRECC/MIRECC Symposium on Neurodegenerative Diseases: The Interface of Psychiatry and Neurology* will be held on Monday, May 24, 2004 at the Inn at Penn, 3600 Sansom Street, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. Parking is available; however, the cost of parking will be your responsibility.



Course Objectives

Upon completion of the program, participants should be able to:

- Identify the differences in diagnosing and treating affective changes in patients with neurodegenerative diseases as compared to other populations
- Discuss the current knowledge on depression in Alzheimer's disease
- Recognize pseudobulbar affect as a distinct manifestation of many neurodegenerative diseases and understand potential treatment options
- Appreciate the risk factors for and phenomenology of drug-induced psychosis in PD and discuss patient management, particularly with regard to the choice of appropriate antipsychotic agents
- Describe the neuropsychological changes that occur in PD and AD and be able to compare and contrast the sequelae of these disorders
- Recognize the importance of sleep and sleepiness as major components of the Parkinsonian symptom complex

Hosting Institution
