
Mission and Priorities

- Continue working toward 95% coverage for all Veterans
- Continue cultivating relationships with state, territorial and tribal cemeteries

Interments, Headstones and Markers

- NCA maintains 4.18 million graves
- 155 National Cemeteries
 - 87 open for all interments
 - 21 open for cremated remains
 - 47 closed to new interments
- 137,895 interments conducted in FY 2023
- Third most ever behind FY22 and FY21
 - > 7,384 at Riverside N.C.
 - ➤ 6,035 at Florida N.C.
 - > 4,955 at Ft. Snelling N.C.
 - > 4,871 at Dallas-Ft. Worth N.C.
 - > 4,945 at Calverton N.C
 - ➤ 4,503 at Jefferson Barracks N.C.
- 333,556 headstones and markers furnished in FY23



Eligibility and Scheduling

- Any service member who dies on active duty or Veteran who was discharged under conditions other than dishonorable
- National Guard members and Reservists who were called to Federal active duty or are entitled to retired pay
- Spouses, dependent children and certain parents
- Pre-Need Eligibility
 Determinations









America's World War II Burial Program (NCA 2020)





Increasing Access

Burial Access for Veterans (%)



- NCA's goal is to achieve 95%.
- Access is defined as providing the Veteran population with reasonable access to a burial option within 75 miles of their homes.





Veterans Cemetery Grants Program

- Since 1978 the Veterans
 Cemetery Grants Program (VCGP)
- Over \$1 Billion in construction grants
- 122 state, tribal, and territory Veteran
 Cemeteries throughout the country
- 14 tribal Veteran cemeteries operational
- FY 2023, state, territory and tribal Veteran
 Cemeteries conducted over 43,500 interments



VA Pacific Strategy

- In 2021, SECVA appointed a career SES to be Senior Advisor for Pacific Strategy for a period of 3 years
- Focuses on synchronization across Veterans Benefits Admin (VBA), Veterans
 Health Admin (VHA), National Cemetery Admin (NCA) to better serve and support
 the needs of Veterans in the Pacific region
 - Build stakeholder/interagency relationships
 - Seek federal, state, territorial and private partnership opportunities to increase benefits and services to eligible Veterans
- DEPSEC's Site Visit/Listening Tour to the Pacific, August 2022





VA Pacific Strategy (cont.)

- > Area includes U.S. Territories, Freely Associated States, and other Countries
 - US territories Guam, American Samoa, and the Commonwealth of Northern Mariana Islands
 - COFA (Compact of Free Association) island nations Federated States of Micronesia (FSM),
 the Republic of the Marshall Islands (RMI), and the Republic of Palau
 - Philippines*, South Korea, Five Eyes (Australia, NZ, UK, Canada), etc.

* only foreign-located VA facility

- ❖ VBA conducts regular outreach and visits to Veterans living in COFA nations (Micronesia, Palau, the Marshall Islands) to inform them about the benefits available to them that they earned through their service
- ❖ VA Pacific Islands Healthcare System (PIHCS) currently provides services at 12 locations in Hawaii and Pacific territories (American Samoa, Guam, and CNMI).

Strategic Landscape

- U.S. has continuing strategic interest in Pacific island region

- Freely Associated States (FAS) under the Compact of Free Association (COFA)
 - FAS receive U.S. economic assistance while granting the U.S. prerogatives to operate military bases on their soil and make decisions that affect mutual security
 - FAS citizens may serve in the U.S. Armed Forces
 - The U.S. will provide roughly \$5.6 billion in COFA funding to the RMI and FSM by 2023 and \$1.06 billion to Palau by 2024, under the previous negotiated Compacts. Compact agreements have been signed.

Challenges / Limitations

- 38 USC 1724 VA generally may not furnish medical care outside the U.S.
 - Exceptions for service-connected disabilities, vocational rehab program
 - Specific authority for care of Veterans in Philippines
 - Foreign Medical Program (FMP) reimburses expenses of service-connected
 Veterans overseas
 - FMP has very low usage in FAS
 - Special authorizations may not apply outside U.S. (e.g., Save Lives Act)
- Travel challenges between islands and to Guam/Hawaii/Mainland





PACT Act

 PACT Act expands VA health care and benefits for Veterans exposed to burn pits and other toxic substances

The PACT Act:

- Expands and extends eligibility for VA health care for Veterans with toxic exposures and Veterans of the Vietnam, Gulf War, and post-9/11 eras
- Adds more than 20 new presumptive conditions for burn pits and other toxic exposures. This change expands benefits for Gulf War era and post-9/11 Veterans.
- Adds more presumptive-exposure locations for Agent Orange and radiation
- Requires VA to provide a toxic exposure screening to every Veteran enrolled in VA health care
- Helps us improve research, staff education, and treatment related to toxic exposures

PACT Act - cont

- PACT Act: added 2 new Agent Orange presumptive conditions:
 - High blood pressure (hypertension)
 - Monoclonal gammopathy of undetermined significance (MGUS)
- Added <u>5 new locations</u> to the list of presumptive locations:
 - Any U.S. or Royal Thai military base in Thailand from January 9, 1962, through June 30, 1976
 - Laos from December 1, 1965, through September 30, 1969
 - Cambodia at Mimot or Krek, Kampong Cham Province from April 16, 1969, through April 30, 1969
 - Guam or American Samoa or in the territorial waters off Guam or American Samoa from January 9, 1962, through July 30, 1980
 - Johnston Atoll or on a ship that called at Johnston Atoll from January 1, 1972, through September 30, 1977
- If Veteran served on active duty in any of these locations, we'll automatically assume (or "presume") that they had exposure to Agent Orange



Proposed COFA Amendments Act of 2023

- Sec. 8. (a) Authorization for Veterans' services
 - Amend 38 USC § 1724
 - Secretary may furnish hospital care and medical services in FAS to a Veteran who is otherwise eligible to receive hospital care and medical service
 - May include Pharmacy
 - Beneficiary travel to/from FAS may be provided
- Outreach and assessment of options
