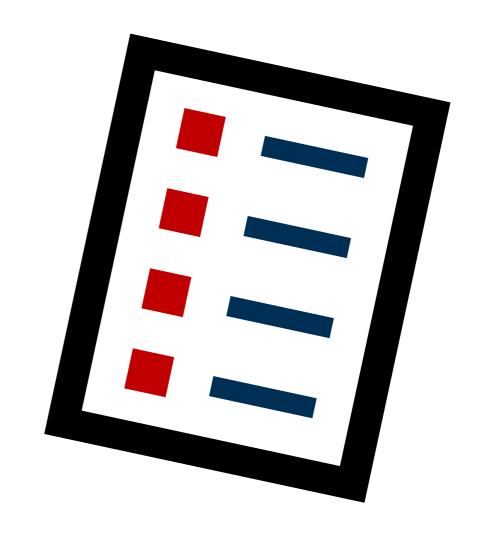

VA'S HOMELESSNESS GOALS FOR CY 2023







Goal 1: Consistency in Permanent Housing

VA will house at least 38,000 more individual Veterans in CY 2023.

Goal 2: Prevention of Returns to Homelessness

- VA will accomplish the ambitious goal of ensuring that at least 95% of Veterans housed during this initiative stay housed.
- At the end of CY 2023, VA will ensure that at least 90% of Veterans who returned to homelessness are rehoused or on a path to rehousing.

Goal 3: Engagement of Unsheltered Veterans

- VA will accomplish the ambitious goal of engaging with at least 28,000 unsheltered Veterans in CY 2023, an increase of 10% from CY 2022.
- In addition, VA intends to decrease the number of unsheltered Veterans counted in the 2024 Point-in-Time Count by 15%.

CY 2023 DASHBOARD DEVELOPMENT

CY 2023 GOALS DASHBOARD OVERVIEW



In Calendar Year (CY) 2023, VA set three goals in continued commitment toward ending Veteran homelessness:

- Permanent Housing: VA will house no less than 38,000 individual Veterans in CY 2023.
- Prevention of Returns to Homelessness: For Veterans who become permanently housed in CY 2023, no more than 5% return to homelessness. Of those who return to homelessness in CY 2023, no less than 90% will be re-housed or placed on a pathway to re-housing in CY 2023.
- Engagement with Unsheltered Veterans: Nationally, VA will increase outreach to and engage with no less than 28,000 unsheltered Veterans.

CY 2023 Goals

- The dashboard defaults to a National view. A specific VISN and VAMC can be selected on the top left of the Dashboard.
- On the top right of the Dashboard is a link to a Report Guide. This guide provides data definitions and VAMC-specific goals.
- The CY 2023 Dashboard will refresh mid-month, displaying CY data through the previous month (reporting month).
- There are three sections (one for each goal) displaying progress made through the current reporting month.

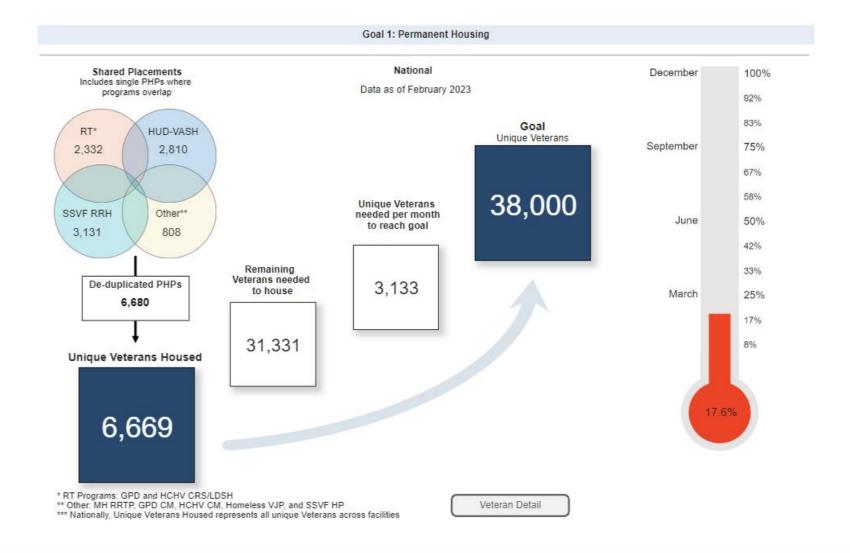




GOAL 1: PERMANENT HOUSING

Unique Veterans Housed

Nationally, unique Veterans housed represents all unique Veterans across facilities.







GOAL: PREVENTION OF RETURNS TO HOMELESSNESS

The second goal starts with the Unique Veterans Housed in CY 2023 from the first goal.

Goal 2: Prevention of Returns to Homelessness

Prevention of Returns to Homelessness: For Veterans who become permanently housed in CY 2023, no more than 5% return to homelessness. Of those who return to homelessness in CY 2023, no less than 90% will be re-housed or placed on a pathway to re-housing in CY 2023.

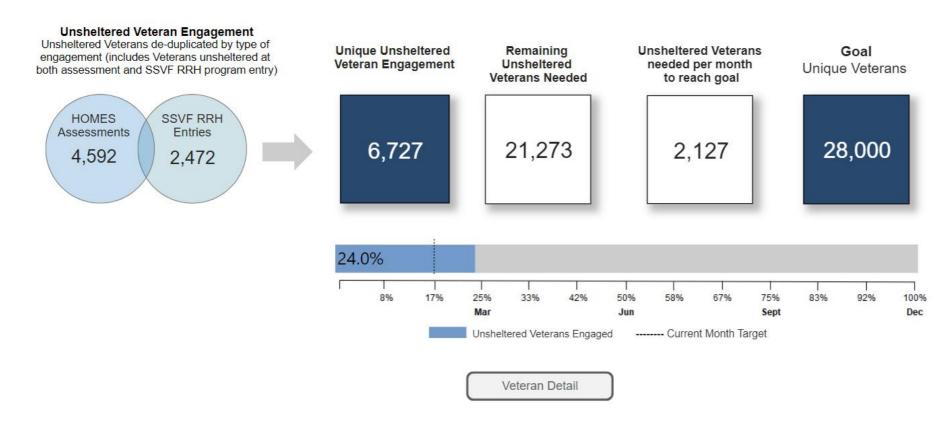

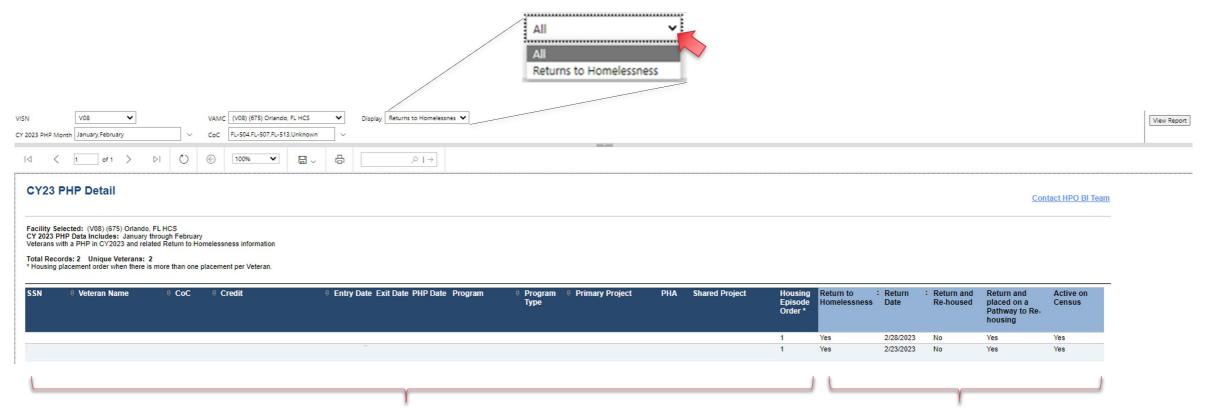

TECHNICAL SPECIFICATIONS







GOAL 1: PERMANENT HOUSING – INCLUDED PROGRAMS

- Following the same methodology as the CY 2022 goal, credit for Veterans placed in permanent housing by the following programs will count toward this goal:
 - All Grant and Per Diem (GPD) grant models (excluding GPD Case Management)
 - Health Care for Homeless Veterans (HCHV) Contracted Residential Services (CRS)
 - HCHV Low Demand Safe Haven (LDSH)
 - HCHV Case Management (CM)
 - Housing and Urban Development-VA Supportive Housing (HUD-VASH)
 - Supportive Services for Veteran Families (SSVF) Rapid Rehousing (RRH)
 - Mental Health Residential Rehabilitation Treatment (MHRRTP) Domiciliary Care for Homeless Veterans (DCHV) and Compensated Work Therapy-Transitional Residence (CWT-TR) bed types
 - GPD CM (for those Veterans who were homeless at entry)
 - SSVF Homeless Prevention (HP) (for Veterans homeless at entry)
 - Veterans Justice Outreach (VJO) (for Veterans homeless at assessment)
 - Health Care for Reentry Veterans (HCRV) (for Veterans homeless at assessment)
 - MHRRTP Substance Use Disorder (SUD), Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD)
 - General bed types (for Veterans homeless at screening).





GOAL 1: PERMANENT HOUSING – INCLUDED DESTINATIONS AND DATA SOURCES

- Permanent housing includes the following destinations:
 - Housing owned by Veteran, no ongoing housing subsidy
 - Housing owned by Veteran, with ongoing housing subsidy
 - Housing rented by Veteran, no ongoing housing subsidy
 - Housing rented by Veteran with HUD-VASH voucher
 - Housing rented by Veteran with a non-HUD-VASH housing subsidy
 - Permanent housing for formerly homeless persons (such as a Continuum of Care project or Shelter+Care)
 - Staying or living with family, permanent tenure
 - Staying or living with friends, permanent tenure
 - Rental by the client, with GPD Transition-in-Place housing subsidy
 - Moved from one Housing Opportunities for Persons With AIDS (HOPWA)-funded project to HOPWA PH
 - Rental by the client, with RRH or equivalent subsidy
 - Host Home (non-crisis)
 - Rental by the client, with Housing Choice Voucher (tenant or project-based)
 - Rental by the client in a public housing unit

- Permanent housing destinations are credited from the following sources:
 - VA Homeless Operations Management and Evaluation System (HOMES)
 - Homeless Management Information (HMIS) SSVF Repository
 - Northeast Program Evaluation Center (NEPEC)





GOAL 2: PREVENTION OF RETURNS TO HOMELESSNESS – DEFINING RETURNS

- Returns are defined by re-engagement in VA Homeless Programs.
 - Re-engagement is identified by a housing status of "literally homeless" at the time of HOMES assessment (for HUD-VASH, GPD, HCHV CRS/LDSH, HCHV CM, HCRV, and VJO) or at SSVF program entry where the Veteran's living situation at entry was sheltered or unsheltered homeless.
 - To account for date variances in service coordination, HOMES assessments and SSVF HMIS entries occurring within a 14day window of the permanent housing placement date will not be considered returns.
- Of those returning to homelessness during CY 2023, according to the specifications above, at least 90% will be re-housed or on a pathway to re-housing, evidenced by either:
 - A return to permanent housing (re-housed) defined as any exit to a permanent destination from HUD-VASH, HCHV
 CRS/LDSH, HCHV CM, GPD (not including GPD CM), HCRV, or VJO after the return date, or an SSVF or HUD-VASH move-in date after the return date.
 - A pathway to permanent housing defined as evidence of re-engagement in VA homeless services during CY 2023. A pathway includes:
 - Current service enrollment in a VA homeless program that provides direct housing support. These programs include HUD-VASH, GPD (not including GPD CM), HCHV CRS/LDSH, HCHV CM, and SSVF. Veterans are considered currently enrolled if a valid entry date is documented and no exit date is documented, or
 - Entry into a VA housing program, including HUD-VASH, GPD (not including GPD CM), HCHV CRS/LDSH, HCHV CM, and SSVF.





GOAL 3: ENGAGEMENT WITH UNSHELTERED VETERANS – COUNTING ENGAGEMENT

- An unsheltered engagement is defined as:
 - Assessments conducted during CY 2023 in which Veterans spent at least 1 night in a place not meant for habitation in the 30 days prior to assessment as documented on a HOMES Assessment, OR
 - SSVF RRH program enrollments during CY 2023 in which Veterans were considered unsheltered at the time of program entry as documented in the HMIS SSVF Repository.
- Targets are established at the VAMC level and are based on 80% of assessments completed for unsheltered Veterans during FY 2019 (pre-COVID-19 assessment levels), except for VAMCs with a more than 50% difference between the 3-year unsheltered Point-in-Time (PIT) count average and the 3-year average number of unsheltered Veterans assessed (including Palo Alto, San Francisco, and Northern California).
