

Overview of One Team Case Conferencing

 Case Conferencing is defined as an inclusive, community process allowing a crosssection of VA and non-VA service providers to work in an open forum to drive reengagement efforts related to Veterans who have returned to homelessness.

 The purpose of One Team case conferencing is for all relevant staff and programs to engage in deliberate, coordinated, Veteran-level case conferencing to ensure all Veterans who have returned to homelessness are rapidly reconnected to VA services and housing pathways.

 One Team case conferencing originated at the VISN level through a directive from VA leadership, however, it should be considered ongoing either regionally or at the VAMC catchment area level.





Goals of One Team Case Conferencing

- Identify and review Veterans who returned to homelessness and have not been re-engaged and are not on a pathway to permanent housing
- Create action plans for engaging those Veterans based on their service history, suspected current location, other contacts, and prior service participation
- Develop specific outreach and triage plans with service enrollment offers or assigning a different/new service partner to engage Veteran and offer housing pathways



Reasons for Returns to Homelessness

Factors	Strategies
Low quality housing	Stronger landlord partnershipsUse of incentives to keep rents lower
Rent increases	Shallow subsidyShared housingNegotiating with landlords
Minimal or lack of services that address needs of high barrier Veterans with mental health and substance use disorders	 Re-orient staffing to better meet needs Leverage peer support
Lack of education/understanding of the lease agreement	 Better tenancy preparation when housing obtained Connection to legal services (if applicable)





Contributing Risk Factors in Returns to Homelessness

There is a combination of reasons why some Veterans return to homelessness, but compared to Veterans who did not return, Veterans who returned to homelessness were:

- 38% more likely to have a diagnosis of drug use disorder.
- 18% more likely to be Black.
- 16% more likely to be unmarried.
- More likely to have no VA service-connected disability.
- More likely to be less engaged in VA outpatient care and more engaged in VA acute care.





Preventing Returns to Homelessness

Risk Factors	Strategies
Substance Use Disorder (SUD)	 Appropriate clinical case management Connection to Health Care Navigation Services Connection to VA and community SUD Services
Black Veterans	Need to assess service equity to promote stable tenancies
Justice Involved Veterans	Connection to VA Veteran Justice Program
Disconnected from VA Service Disability Benefits	 Connection to VA and/or mainstream benefits Shallow subsidy and other rent supports
Disconnected from VA Outpatient Care	 Connection to Homeless PACT Team Connection to community healthcare services Connection to Health Care Navigation Services Connection to transportation services Connection to peer support services





Strategies to Re-engage Veterans



System Level Strategies and Tools to Re-engage Veterans

- One Team Case Conferencing
- Coordinated outreach and prioritization
- Progressive engagement strategies (incl. with CE/ CoC and Local VA partnerships)
- Data systems to track Veterans



Project Level Strategies and Tools to Re-engage Veterans

- Peer support and/or people with lived experience
- Trauma-informed Care
- Motivational interviewing
- Incentives (Landlord and Veteran incentives)
- Identify Veterans so we can target (CES), not going to the back of the line
- Connections to other services (social supports, employment, etc.)
- Culturally Competent Services





State Homeless Veteran Registry (HVR)

An overview with bi-weekly meetings to review the needs of homeless Veterans.

- This tool assists us in identifying and prioritizing those Veterans who need to be re-engaged
- The HVR pulls together all providers and information on previous experiences with Veterans
- Data is broken down into different regions of the state
- Brings community resources together to collaborate in one place.
