- "[I]t never dawned on us that we may have done it to ourselves."
- "...We know that at least 43,000 American troops may have been overexposed to pesticides," Vesser said, adding that more than 250,000 American troops took the small, white pyridostigmine bromide pills.
- "Both of these substances may cause symptoms that are consistent with the symptoms that some Gulf War veterans have."
