

As vaccinations rise, entering CAVHS facilities gets one step easier



As more Veterans, caregivers and family members get their COVID-19 vaccination CAVHS continues to see an encouraging drop in positive cases of the virus. However, we remain vigilant while easing visitation and screening at our facilities. CAVHS continues to require face masks, social distancing, and hand hygiene in the fight to contain the transmission of COVID-19 and end the pandemic.

It is now easier to enter a CAVHS facility and limited numbers of visitors are being welcomed into the hospital, medical center and Community Based Outpatient Clinics (CBOCs).

Veterans with scheduled appointments at Fort Roots in North Little Rock will be greeted by a Red Coat Ambassador at the main and north entrances of the Eugene J. Towbin VA Medical Center (building (170).

Veterans entering the John L. McClellan Memorial Veterans Hospital in Little Rock will be greeted by Red Coat Ambassadors at the main and south entrances from 7:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., Monday through Friday. After 5:00 p.m. and on weekends, VA police will be located near the main entrance to assist.

Red Coat Ambassadors or security personnel will ensure that everyone entering a facility is wearing a mask, and will provide one if needed. Veterans and visitors will be screened at the clinic or unit to which they are reporting. Anyone with symptoms associated with COVID-19 will be isolated and testing will be arranged.

Visitation changes

Inpatients are now allowed one visitor over the age of 18 at a time. Community Living Center limited face-to-face visits are available by appointment only and window visits continue to be available. Contact the nurse manager of unit social worker to arrange a visit.

- Visiting hours for the Medical/ Surgical and stepdown units are 10:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m.
- Visiting hours for Intensive Care Units (MICU and SICU) are 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m.
- One to two visitors over the age of 18 may be allowed on the Palliative Care unit; visiting hours are flexible depending on the patient's status.

Visitors must check in with the unit prior to entering an inpatient room and are required to wear a mask.

Outpatient Veterans may have one visitor/caregiver over the age of 18 accompany them to their appointment.
