US Army Veteran Bryan McCrickerd, a former combat engineer, injured his back on the job. When his doctor told him he would be in a wheelchair for the rest of his life Bryan was devastated. He fell into a depression for a while, but it was his introduction to adaptive sports that brought him back to life.

In 2017 he first tried an archery competition. Bryan competed in the Para division, while his 16-yearold son competed in another division. After a short amount of practice with the bow and arrow, Bryan started winning. He was hooked on adaptive sports; the adrenalin rush helped improve his well-being and he enjoyed the socialization.

Bryan soon discovered there were several national competitions for disabled Veterans and VA gave grants for Veterans to be active that would help with the expenses to participate. Over the last 5 years, Bryan has enjoyed cycling, skiing, golfing, hunting, sled hockey, kayaking, waterskiing, as well as archery. He is eager to try all adaptive sports but due to his back injury his doctor told him he is not approved for rugby. Bryan and his service dog, Reo, display some of his new medals.

This year alone, Bryan has brought over 20 medals and other awards back home to Pennsylvania. Adaptive sports has been such a rewarding and fulfilling experience for Bryan that he said, "My dream is for every Veteran to try adaptive sports. There are so many to choose from." He is now a regular at VA's national competitions including: the Golden Age Games in lowa, Wheelchair Games in Oregon, Winter Sports Clinic in Colorado, Summer Sports Clinic in San Diego and Golf Clinic in Iowa.

In September, he got to play golf with the Honorable Denis Richard McDonough, Secretary of Veterans Affairs at the annual disabled Veterans golf clinic and was thrilled to receive his challenge coin. Bryan also participates in the Valor Games Southeast which are funded by a VA grant. Bryan's wife, Rose McCrickerd said, "My son and I will travel anywhere in the world just to see the smile on Bryan's face."

Robotic Surgery Update

2022 Physician of the Year

Since the da Vinci robot-assisted surgery system was installed at our main campus last year, it has been used for urology, colorectal and general surgery procedures like hernia repair, colectomies, cholecystectomies (gall bladder removals) and prostatectomies. Recently, our surgery team completed the first two robotic gynecologic cases including a hysterectomy and tubes-tied procedure. Benefits include less blood loss, shorter hospital stays and quicker recovery. Robot-assisted surgery allows surgeons to make smaller incisions with greater precision, resulting in less pain and less blood loss for the patient. Not only does this mean smaller, less noticeable scars but hospital stays and recovery times are often shorter with a reduced risk of infection post-surgery. We have chosen to make this investment to better serve our Veterans.


