Housing Homeless Veterans

Exceeding Goals

After two years of pandemic shutdowns, our Health Care for Homeless Veterans (HCHV) program faced numerous challenges in getting Veterans into housing. Our biggest issues, according to VAPHS HCHV Program Coordinator Mary Frances Pilarski, was lining up landlords and transportation.

But we met the challenge by meeting — and then exceeding — our goals.

VA in 2022 set a national goal of finding permanent housing for 38,000 Veterans. Our goal as part of that initiative was to place 224 Veterans using programs such as Grant and Per Diem (GPD) transitional housing, U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development-VA Supportive Housing (HUD-VASH) permanent housing, and Supporting Services for Veterans/Families (SSVF) for the Pittsburgh region.

By the third quarter of 2022, we had met our initial goal. By the end of the calendar year, we surpassed

it by 33 percent. In all, we used VA's GPD, HUD-VASH and SSVF programs to place 298 homeless Veterans in permanent housing.

Nationally, the total number of Veterans experiencing homelessness has decreased by 11% since January 2020. In total, the estimated number of Veterans experiencing homelessness in America has declined by 55.3% since 2010.

Long COVID Clinic Established

Treats Debilitating Post-COVID Symptoms

We established a multi-specialty clinic to treat Veterans with long COVID, a condition in which debilitating symptoms linger after infection has passed. Ten to 30 percent of patients who have recovered from COVID-19 report new, returning or worsened symptoms known as post-COVID conditions. They include sleep loss, heart and lung issues, and trouble with mental processes such as thinking, learning, problem-solving and memory.

The clinic's multidisciplinary team includes physicians, psychologists, nurses, physical therapists, social workers, researchers and hearing and speech specialists who address Veterans' psychological, physical and mental health needs. The team also gathers information on post-COVID conditions for research.

Reducing CHF Readmissions

Veterans who are hospitalized with congestive heart failure (CHF) are now less likely to return to us within 30 days of discharge for inpatient treatment. We made improvements in 2022 in patient and staff education, required scheduling of all CHF follow-up appointments within 14 days of discharge, and created policies mandating home-telehealth and outpatient CHF consults.

The changes saw the percentage of unadjusted CHF readmissions drop from 20.37% in fiscal year 2019 to just 9.52% in fiscal year 2022.

IMPROVING THE VETERAN EXPERIENCE



New Observatory Opens the Galaxies to Our Veterans

Our H.J. Heinz III campus now houses the first observatory for Veterans at a VA medical center.

We dedicated the observatory during a ribbon-cutting ceremony on Oct. 14. Its telescope features two cameras, an autofocus feature and a remote-controlled base. It is preprogrammed with the locations of over 200,000 stars. Volunteers assist Veterans in the telescope's use and operation.

The observatory is compliments of Astronomy for Disabled Veterans, a combined effort by the Western Pennsylvania Knights of Columbus, the Amateur Astronomers Association of Pittsburgh (AAAP) and Carnegie Mellon University. Over 400 Knights of Columbus members from 28 Western Pennsylvania councils and assemblies raised \$31,000 to build the observatory. The AAAP donated materials and provided training.

Goggles Help Diagnose Dizziness

Diagnosing dizziness in patients can be difficult when the problem doesn't happen in the doctor's office. In 2022, our clinicians began to test take-home goggles their patients can put on when a dizzy spell happens.

Created by a neurologist at VA Northeast Ohio Healthcare System, the prototype goggles record the eye movements needed to establish a cause for dizziness. Patients don the goggles at the start of a dizzy spell. The goggles record and save up to 10 minutes of their eye movements. VA Pittsburgh providers later download the recordings to identify a cause for each patient's dizziness.

The trial will help determine whether the goggles will work on a larger scale, to the benefit of the 7 million people in the U.S. affected with episodic dizziness.

Improving Diabetes Care

In 2022, VHA's Office of Health Equity awarded \$100,000 to Dr. Archana Bandi to further her ELEGANT-DM2 collaborative approach to diabetes care aimed at eliminating disparity.

Endocrinologists, clinical pharmacists and primary care providers work together to proactively implement effective therapies without separate referrals to specialists. Bandi works to ensure providers consider newer diabetes medications in a timely manner to preserve kidney function, help with weight loss, and better manage congestive heart failure, all commonly seen with diabetes.

Laser-Based Device Finds Veins

We adopted a vein-visualization device in our Community Living Center that uses near-infrared technology to help clinicians see Veterans' veins when drawing blood. The laser-based device identifies a vein's location if it cannot be seen or felt. It allows us to draw blood on the first try, reducing the number of needle sticks and improving the Veteran's experience.

Changing Maternity Care for Women Veterans

Study aims to improve pregnancy outcomes

The Center for Health Equity Research and Promotion (CHERP) on our University Drive campus is using data from a CHERP pilot study to identify ways to improve the health of women Veterans before pregnancy.

The pilot study of more than 31,000 pregnancies found a high rate of short- and long-term pregnancy-related complications among women Veterans nationwide who used VA maternity benefits between fiscal years 2010 and 2017. It found that Black Veterans had higher odds than their white peers of serious complications during pregnancy or within a year of the end of pregnancy.

Previous research suggests more than 60% of pregnancy-related deaths and near deaths are preventable. The key may be improving women's health before pregnancy. Women Veterans have high rates of chronic medical and mental health conditions, and many fall into vulnerable groups at

a greater risk for pregnancy-related complications. Forty-eight percent identify as non-white, and 25% live in rural areas.

Dr. Deirdre Quinn, a CHERP core investigator who has a doctorate in family science, in 2022 expanded the pilot study to gather numerical data on possible pre-pregnancy health risks and the connection between vulnerable groups and adverse maternal outcomes.



IMPROVING MATERNAL OUTCOMES

VAPHS resources to improve maternal outcomes include our Reproductive Health Clinic offering preconception counseling and pregnancy services. In 2022, the clinic implemented an emergency protocol to lower complications to mother and baby from severe maternal hypertension, or high blood pressure during pregnancy.

Expanding Our
Telehealth Reach

Dr. Lynn Baniak, an associate chief nurse for research who has a doctorate in nursing science, developed patient-centered training to improve telehealth-visit usage among Veterans. Through her Learning Information Network Connection Tools (LINCT) project, Baniak and her team spoke to Veterans to understand what would make a successful telehealth visit. Using what they learned, they developed the training for staff and Veterans. Future plans include providing the training at Vet Centers and in rural communities.

Looking for Cancer with a Blood Draw

Pilot program aims for early detection

We began piloting a new cancer-screening tool in 2022 that requires only a simple blood draw for testing.

VA and the Veterans Health Foundation partnered with GRAIL, LLC, to provide Veterans access to GRAIL's groundbreaking Galleri multi-cancer early detection (MCED) blood test. GRAIL has made its MCED test available to 10,000 Veterans across approximately 10 sites, starting here at VA Pittsburgh.

We offer the blood-screening tests as part of the REFLECTION clinical real-world evidence study. The study will review if Galleri, along with other standard cancer screenings, can find cancers at an early stage when treatment is most likely to be successful.

In fiscal year 2022, we provided the test to 27 Veterans.



VA Post-Surgery Outcomes Better Than Private Sector

A Department of Veterans Affairs study that included VA Pittsburgh data found that Veterans who undergo non-cardiac surgery at VA hospitals have a 40% lower adjusted risk of 30-day mortality than in the private sector. For frail and very frail patients, the risk of death within 30 days of surgery was even lower.

Senior author Dr. Daniel E. Hall of VA's Center for Health Equity Research and Promotion on our University Drive campus said VA's wraparound services and integrated care networks "might go a long way to explaining" the study's findings. VA is uniquely positioned to care for Veterans' additional needs, taking mental health, addiction treatment, transportation and housing into consideration when providing surgical care.



MAXIMIZING VETERANS' ACCESS

Monroeville Clinic Construction Nears Completion

Grand Opening Set for 2023

Construction on our new Monroeville VA Outpatient Clinic continued in earnest in 2022 with an eye on a summer 2023 grand opening. We will staff and operate the clinic, which is located on Mall Circle Drive, near Monroeville Mall.


The new state-of-the-art facility will improve Veterans' access to primary and specialty outpatient services and reduce drive times for many Pittsburgh-area Veterans enrolled in VA care. Moving Veterans' primary care teams to the Monroeville location will open space on our University Drive campus to expand our Emergency Department and specialty care services.

The U.S. General Services Administration in 2021 awarded the \$92 million build-to-suit lease for the clinic. The lease includes 64,000 square feet of parking and supports VA's Strategic Capital Investment Planning process.




ATLAS Site Brings Telehealth to Veterans

We partnered with Greene County and the Louis A. Johnson VA Medical Center in Clarksburg, West Virginia, to open an Accessing Telehealth through Local Area Station (ATLAS) site in Waynesburg.

ATLAS sites include all equipment needed for telehealth visits in Veterans' communities, reducing travel times and addressing barriers such as poor internet connectivity at home. The ATLAS site at the Greene County Office Building, 93 East High Street, allows Veterans to connect virtually with their VA Pittsburgh or Clarksburg providers.

Contraception on Demand

Our Contraception on Demand innovation allows VHA pharmacists to dispense a year's supply of hormonal contraception — most often birth control pills — to women Veterans. With the number of women Veterans using VA increasing, giving them easy access to contraceptive services is a top priority for VA's Office of Women's Health.

Contraception on Demand expands Veterans' access to contraceptives and improves their experiences with reproductive health care at VA. It also trains clinical pharmacists in patient-centered contraceptive counseling and improves their job satisfaction. VHA named the innovation, developed at the Center for Health Equity Research and Development on our University Drive campus, among its 10 Promising Practices for 2022.

The practice is easy to adopt and implement at very low cost to individual VA facilities, resulting in an estimated cost savings for the health system at large. Among the first to adopt it was VISN 8 in Florida, which includes VA medical centers in Orlando, Tampa, Miami and West Palm Beach.

CLC Recognized for Age-Friendly Care

Initiative Focuses on Individual Needs and Goals

Our H.J. Heinz III Community Living Center (CLC) achieved recognition as a Level 2 Age-Friendly Health System through the Age-Friendly Health Systems initiative. The recognition assures VAPHS's CLC Veterans they are receiving evidence-based care tailored to their individual needs, preferences and goals.

The Age-Friendly Health Systems initiative focuses on four essential elements of care for older patients called the 4Ms:

- **What Matters:** Know and align care with each older adult's specific health outcome goals and care preferences including, but not limited to, end-of-life care, and across settings of care.
- **Medication:** If medication is necessary, use age-friendly medications that do not interfere with what matters to the older adult, mobility, or mental activity across settings of care.

- **Mental Activity:** Prevent, identify, treat and manage dementia, depression and delirium across settings of care.
- **Mobility:** Ensure that older adults move safely every day in order to maintain function and do what matters.

Joining the age-friendly initiative provides us with a framework of evidence-based care that puts what matters to the older Veteran at the forefront. Our Home-Based Primary Care (HBPC) program also participates in the initiative. Annually, we provide care to some 200 older Veterans in our CLC and 150 in our HBPC program.

Surgical Safety Net Prevents Post-Operative Readmissions

Our Preventing Post-Operative Readmissions with Surgical Safety Net innovation reduces hospital readmissions and enhances Veterans' overall surgical experience from admission to recovery. It uses a high-reliability process to identify at-risk patients before their surgeries. The Surgical Safety Net combines nursing, physical therapy, telehealth and social work, plus a 24/7 staffed phone service, to give Veterans wraparound surgical care.

VHA named the innovation, developed through our Interdisciplinary Medical, Preoperative, Assessment, Consultation and Treatment (IMPACT) Clinic, among its 10 Promising Practices for 2022. VISN 16's Central Arkansas VA Healthcare System elected to adopt the innovation, with plans to use existing resources such as physical therapy, social work, etc., to coordinate with the practice.

Age-Friendly Emergency Department

Our Emergency Department (ED) received a Level 3 Geriatric ED (GED) accreditation from the American College of Emergency Physicians (ACEP) in 2022. The accreditation assures older Veterans we have age-friendly policies, training and equipment in place to meet their specific needs and elevate the level of their care.

ACEP-accredited GEDs follow evidence-based policies, protocols and procedures that improve health care delivery for older adults. As an ACEP Level 3 accredited GED, we have training and programs in place to treat older Veterans with complex conditions; identify unmet needs; and better coordinate follow-up care. We also provide mobility devices such as canes and walkers, and easy access to food and drink.

VA in 2021 launched a geriatric emergency department initiative that aimed to establish 70 VA EDs as GEDs by December 2022.

The Commission on Cancer (CoC), a quality program of the American College of Surgeons, granted our cancer program a three-year accreditation in 2022. As a CoC-accredited cancer center, we take a multidisciplinary approach to treating cancer as a complex group of diseases that requires consultation among surgeons, medical and radiation oncologists, diagnostic radiologists, pathologists and other cancer specialists. This multidisciplinary partnership results in improved patient care. The voluntary accreditation assures Veterans our cancer program meets 34 CoC quality care standards, is evaluated every three years through a survey process, and maintains levels of excellence in the delivery of comprehensive patient-centered care.


