

Accessing Urgent Care

This guide will help you understand how to access urgent care services from a provider in VA's contracted network. The urgent care benefit provides eligible Veterans with greater choices and access to timely, high-quality care.

What is the urgent care benefit?

VA offers eligible Veterans an urgent care benefit for the treatment of minor injuries and illnesses at retail and urgent care providers who are part of VA's contracted network. **The urgent care benefit is offered to Veterans in addition to urgent care and same-day services VA provides through its medical facilities.**

What type of care do urgent care providers provide?

Urgent care providers treat injuries and illnesses that require immediate attention but are not life-threatening, such as the common cold, minor burns and skin infections.

Am I eligible for urgent care?

To be eligible for the urgent care benefit, you must (1) be enrolled in the VA healthcare system, AND (2) have received care through VA, from either a VA or a community provider within the last 24 months.

How do I access urgent care?

Use VA's Facility Locator at <https://www.va.gov/find-locations>. To find an urgent care location, select the "Urgent care" VA facility type and then "Community urgent care providers (in VA's network)" from the service type drop-down. You can also call your local VA medical facility to find an in-network urgent care provider.

What do I do when I arrive?

Tell the urgent care provider you would like to use your VA urgent care benefit and confirm that they are part of VA's network. They will confirm your eligibility for the benefit. If there is an issue verifying your eligibility or if you have any other issue at an urgent care location in AK, AS, AZ, CA, CO, GU, HI, ID, MP, MT, NM, NV, OR, TX, UT, WA, and WY call **866-620-2071**. In DC, PR, VI, and all other states, call **888-901-6609**.

HOW DO I CONFIRM I AM ELIGIBLE?

To check eligibility, **call** 800-MyVA411 (800) 698-2411 or contact your local medical facility.

HOW CAN I CONFIRM THAT THE PROVIDER IS IN VA'S NETWORK?

You can determine if a provider is in-network by using the VA's facility locator at <https://www.va.gov/find-locations>. For telephone assistance finding locations, please **call** 877-881-7618 (8 a.m. – 8 p.m. ET).

WHAT ELSE DO I NEED TO KNOW?

If you believe your life or health is in danger, call 911 or go to the nearest emergency department right away.

You do **NOT** have an insurance card for this benefit.

Do **NOT** pay a copayment at the time of visit—if you are eligible for this benefit. VA will bill you separately for any applicable copayment.

OTHER QUESTIONS YOU MAY HAVE

Will I have to pay any fees or copayments out-of-pocket?

You may be charged a copayment that is different from other VA medical copayments. Copayments depend on your assigned priority group and the number of times you visit an urgent care provider in a calendar year.

Priority Group	Copayment Amount (per calendar year)
1 – 5	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• First three (3) visits: \$0• Fourth and > visits: \$30
6	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• If related to combat experience, *special authority or exposure:<ul style="list-style-type: none">▪ First three (3) visits: \$0▪ Fourth and > visits: \$30• If not related to combat experience, special authority or exposure:<ul style="list-style-type: none">▪ \$30 per visit
7 – 8	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• \$30 per visit
1 – 8	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• \$0 copay for a visit consisting of only a flu shot

There is no limit on the number of times you can access urgent care.

Copayments are NOT paid out-of-pocket at the time you receive care. They are billed separately by VA.

Beginning April 4, 2023, eligible Indian and urban Indian Veterans no longer have to pay a copay for urgent care.

Can I use urgent care as a replacement for my primary care needs?

No. Urgent care is not a replacement for preventive health care or management of chronic or complex health conditions. You should work with your primary care provider for this type of care. **If you go to an urgent care provider and receive non-covered services, you are responsible for the full cost of care.**

Is urgent care prescription medication covered by VA?

VA will pay for or fill prescriptions resulting from your urgent care visit.

Urgent care prescriptions for medication longer than a 14-day supply must be sent to VA to be filled.

You can fill a 14-day supply of medication written by an urgent care provider at a contracted pharmacy within the VA network, a non-contracted pharmacy that is not part of the VA network, or directly at a VA pharmacy. Opiates will be limited to seven days or less, consistent with the pharmacy location's state law.

If a non-contracted pharmacy is used, you must pay for the prescription and then file a claim for reimbursement with your local VA medical facility.

Do I have to pay a copayment for urgent care prescription medication?

You may be required to pay a copayment for medication. These will be billed separately to you, by VA, as a part of VA's normal billing process.

Does VA reimburse beneficiary travel for an urgent care visit?

VA reimburses beneficiary travel for eligible Veterans that must travel to receive community care. Payment is made for the distance to either the nearest VA medical facility or community medical facility that could have provided the care or services.

Special authority: include those related to combat service and exposures (e.g. Agent Orange, active dusty at Camp Lejeune, Ionizing radiation, Project Shipboard Hazard and Defense (SHAD/ Project 112), Southwest Asia Conditions) as well as Military Sexual Trauma, and presumptions applicable to certain Veterans with psychosis and other mental illnesses.
