Biases, Prejudice, Discrimination, & Racism

Biases: inclinations or preferences in favor or against a group, idea, thing, etc.

Prejudice: thoughts or emotions towards people based on their group membership(s)

Discrimination: biased behavior or treatment toward a group or its members

Racism: the merging of racist ideas and racist policies which produces and normalizes racial oppression and inequities



THE LENS OF SYSTEMIC OPPRESSION

INDIVIDUAL

SYSTEMIC

INTERPERSONAL

INDIVIDUAL

A *person's* beliefs & actions that serve to perpetuate oppression

- conscious and unconscious
- externalized and internalized

The *interactions*between people
—both within and
across difference

INSTITUTIONAL

Policies and practices at the organization (or "sector") level that perpetuate oppression

STRUCTURAL

How these effects interact and accumulate *across institutions*—and across history


Intersectionality

- Kimberlé Crenshaw is credited for coining the term intersectionality (1989)
- Intersectionality: a framework that considers the compounding and interconnected nature of cultural identities and systems of oppression, as well as the power, privilege, and marginalization that may result




Intersectional Framework

 - Innermost circle & Second layer




Intersectional Framework I

 - Final Layer

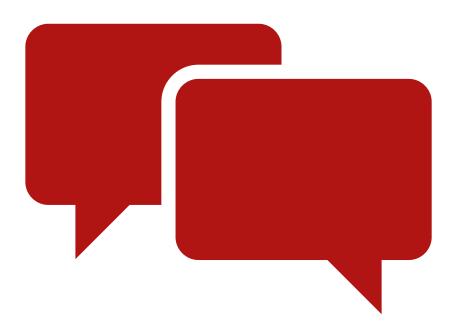
