The team meets weekly (Fridays) to review and track the progress of each homeless Veteran until they are permanently housed. Every homeless veteran is identified by name and kept on a list that is distributed each week. Every week there are updates given on the status of each person identified on the list and whomever is working with that individual will provide information as well as time lines / barriers to getting them housed. Barriers are identified as related to each homeless Veteran on an individual basis. The team then decides which level of service can best meet that particular Veteran’s needs to resolve any barriers related to rapidly re-housing that Veteran. The veteran stays on that list until it has been confirmed through the meetings that the individual is housed. Through our weekly meetings we have been able to build strong relationships and communication occurs throughout the week, in between meetings, to help address any barriers that have been identified.

There are plans to further integrate SSVF into the CoC's planning, oversight and coordinated assessment process. Since SSVF programs are represented in each week's meetings, we are there to further educate and provide guidance on the benefits of SSVF program to our veteran homeless population.

The Greater New Orleans Veterans Navigators are homeless service providers within the CoC that strategize each week how to navigate homeless Veterans to eligible services and programs to end homelessness for each Veteran identified within the CoC. The meetings are conducted each Monday afternoon and are lead by the CoC. All SSVF providers, representatives from community shelters, Veteran Affairs, various CoC programs, and homeless service providers participate in this meeting. At the meetings, Greater New Orleans review HMIS data that captures Veterans who have become homeless and/or currently homeless living in a place not meant for habitation. Each homeless Veteran is tracked on a secure Google Doc which allows the group to review and refer the homeless Veteran to permanent housing and/or other available supportive services. The group also strategizes solutions to address unique barriers for permanent housing on an individual basis. Each Veteran's case is reviewed to monitor contact, ability to link to VASH or PSH assistance, and referral to other supports as identified. Regularly, emails, follow-up calls, and/or texts are sent out by CoC staff when a homeless person identifies themselves as a Veteran. The SSVF providers and other community providers then triage the homeless Veteran to ensure immediate services can be provided as soon as possible, which demonstrate a procedure under the functional zero system. This time also offers the group to find solutions to service barriers, share information in regards to landlord outreach, review vocational opportunities, and share new resources available to Veterans in the community of Greater New Orleans. The group has worked collaboratively to develop the community plan. Greater New Orleans evolve processes in order to meet the needs of the Veteran population and to ensure the streamline process illustrate a seamless transition for Veteran households.

We have a committed local leadership with the Mayor's Office in the City of New Orleans, which is currently working through a strategy to commit 200 Housing Choice Vouchers to assist Veterans with stable and permanent housing. In addition, the local CoC is strong with its commitment to the project by agreeing to prioritize CoC permanent and rapid re-housing resources for Veterans who may not qualify for VASH or VHA benefits. The City of New Orleans has also reached out to local VFW, Veteran organizations, and active Military to volunteer resources and time for assistance with homeless outreach, donation of goods and houseware items, assistance with Veterans move in, and peer assistance for Veterans in need. The leadership provided by the CoC and the Mayor's Office have bridged a gap with the local Veteran Affairs and Department of Housing and Urban Development offices to find solutions to service and housing barriers for homeless Veterans. With the CoC and SSVF, we have embraced Housing First and Harm Reduction principles to afford each Veteran experiencing homelessness an opportunity for permanent housing.

The Board of Directors for the CoC meets quarterly to review progress toward CoC goals including the goal of ending Veteran homelessness by 2015. Action steps to achieve this goal were developed and adopted by the Board during a 2013 planning process. Progress on each action step is reviewed at each quarterly meeting. Information reviewed during these meetings includes the status of the CoC's SSVF and GPD programs' progress toward CoC plan goals including increasing bed capacity to targeted CoC levels. Continuation of ongoing outreach is also reviewed throughout the project period. The CoC has one SSVF program serving the entire CoC area. That program provides leadership and monitoring of the day-to-day efforts to end Vet homelessness including conducting outreach, identifying homeless Vets/Vet families by name, and seeing a Housing Plan for each is created or providing referrals to appropriate programs that will do so.

Strengths include a very aggressive outreach and engagement process conducted by the CoC's SSVF program; sufficient SSVF resources to serve those Vets/Vet families that qualify for SSVF; deep commitment across the CoC to ending Vet homelessness. Challenges: very limited stock of affordable housing in the CoC area; extremely high poverty rate across the CoC area -- among the highest in the US in some parishes (counties) in the CoC; limited community resources to serve the 56% percent of persons in the CoC; area including homeless persons including Vets; lack of public transportation in 11 of the CoC's 12 service area parishes, so that programs serving homeless Vets must provide or pay for transportation of homeless Vets being served to appointments, medical care, etc.; distance to the nearest VAMC which is outside the CoC area, over 100 miles away for most area Vets; extremely high unemployment in the CoC area -- typically highest in the state

Service providers within the CoC will strategize each month how to navigate homeless Veterans to eligible services and programs to end homelessness for each Veteran identified within the CoC. The meetings will be conducted at the Terrebonne Parish Library on the 4th Monday of each month. The local SSVF provider, representatives from community shelters and CoC programs, and homeless service providers will participate in this meeting. At the meetings, we will review HMIS data that captures Veterans who have become homeless and/or currently homeless living in a place not meant for habitation. Each homeless Veteran will be tracked on an encrypted spreadsheet which will allow the group to review and refer the homeless Veteran to permanent housing and/or other available supportive services. The group will also strategize solutions to address unique barriers for permanent housing on an individual basis. The CoC has reached out to local VFW, Veteran organizations, and active Military to volunteer resources and time for assistance with homeless outreach, donation of goods and houseware items, assistance with Veterans move in, and peer assistance for Veterans in need. A local Rotary Club is in the process of donating household items to assist veterans as they move into permanent housing.
