The RI CoC Veterans Sub-Committee is leading the way in identifying homeless Veterans. The Committee has a by-name listing of homeless veterans, prioritized by most in need. We have all the Housing Authorities on the Board to include the Homeless Shelter Representatives that will help connect to veteran to the Board then collaborate with the Housing Authorities to mate veterans with housing. The Board is meeting once a week until the end of December. RI has established a very aggressive plan and have all the major players involved. We have identified and housed several veterans in the last two meeting alone. We have HMIS specialist on the Board to ensure placed veterans are removed from the VI-SADAT. The Veterans Subcommittee continues to brief to CoC on its progress. All the major Homeless and Veteran Agencies are represented.
